I saw Mrs Carr and her daughter Miss Jean this morning .
Miss Jean does not get up early, so I saw her in bed. She
appeared to me to have considerably improved since I saw
her in 1935, but she still has not regained full confidence in
herself, and I do not consider it would be to her advantage
to give her charge of her affairs. She is quite content to
remain under a Receiver, and she is happy to know that her
brother is to be appointed to replace her Mother, with whom
she has, apparently, never been on the best of terms. Miss
Jean can now go out in a motor car, and can meet people.
but she is unable to go for walks by herself. She is said
to worry considerably about her physical health, and she is

She is thin and frail looking.

Miss Jean spends a good deal of time away from home and this I think is all to the good.
