Module Description	This module surveys key theories, frameworks and tools that facilitates an understanding of the core principles underpinning origins, effects, and public health responses used in conflict- and crisis-affected settings, and among conflict- and crisis-affected populations.
Duration	Studies for distance learning modules begin in early October. At this time, module materials will be made available on Moodle once fees have been paid. Students may start their studies at any time from the beginning of October and work through the material until the start of the June assessments. However, students are encouraged to commence their studies in October and work steadily through the materials over the course of the academic year and must adhere to other assessment submission deadlines.

## **Module Aim and Intended Learning Outcomes**

#### Overall aim of the module

The overall module aim is to:

 enable students to develop appropriate responses to current health-related challenges and policy debates to populations affected by conflict and crisis.

## **Module Intended Learning Outcomes**

Upon successful completion of the module a student should be able to:

- 1. Describe the causes of crises and the effect of crises on health;
- 2. Understand the humanitarian system and the key health sectors (i.e. health, nutrition, and WASH), and sub-sectors (e.g. sexual and reproductive health, mental health and psychosocial services)
- 3. Critically assess institutional actors, approaches, and policy debates of the international humanitarian system;
- 4. Define context-specific interventions for acute and chronic healthcare delivery and security;
- 5. Demonstrate an ability to assess key issues in the transition from relief to rehabilitation, health systems strengthening, and post-conflict recovery.

# **Indicative Syllabus**

### **Session Content**

The module is expected to cover the following topics:

- The nature and origins of crises (including conflict) and the effect of crises on health and health systems;
- Humanitarianism, humanitarian principles, aid, and ethics;
- The decolonial critique of humanitarianism, the humanitarian system and its actors
- Issues in assessment, priority setting, and monitoring and evaluation of health interventions,

#### **Session Content**

 Reconstruction including complexities of the linkages between emergency relief and longer-term development, and health system strengthening

## **Teaching and Learning Strategy**
